Your Right to Vote

Did you vote? Canadians typically turnout at federal polling stations in lower numbers than ideal, when compared to eligible voters who could have voted. Elections are important and should be viewed as such by citizens.

Presenting Canadian election figures involves several challenges. The data contained in official election results since Confederation have not been reported consistently. In the case of an election by acclamation, for instance, the number of registered electors on the lists for that electoral district was included in the total number of registered electors for some elections, but not for others. In other cases, lists of electors were not prepared for some districts. In Prince Edward Island, no lists were prepared in the entire province for several elections.

Moreover, a number of electoral districts were dual-member constituencies until 1966. As each elector could vote for more than one candidate, the reported number of votes cast (valid and rejected ballots) was higher than it would have been in a single-member scenario. Voter turnout figures have been corrected where appropriate: to estimate turnout in these cases, the total number of votes cast in a plural-member electoral district was divided by the number of members elected from that district.

Voter turnout over the years can be as high as 77.4% in November of 1900 to a low of 44.2% during a referendum in September of 1898. Voter Turnout during federal elections from the year 2000 to date have averaged 63.7%, leaving many ballots unmarked. End

This was not the case during this election cycle. Advanced polls saw record numbers of voters casting ballots. Two million voters up from 1.2 million in the 2021 federal election, this was on Good Friday alone.

In Norwich Township the trend toward higher elector turnout was on pace with the rest of the country. A poll worker at Emily Stowe Public School, the advanced polling location, indicated a steady stream of people had voted up to mid day Sunday when I was there. This was reconfirmed at the end of voting on Monday, as turnout was strong for the entire advanced polls.
